PROFILE OF MEMBER:

I am a health researcher interested in improving the lives of those affected by a neurological condition. I completed a BSc and a Research Master's degree in Marine Sciences before making a career change and training as an Occupational Therapist in 2009. My interest in complex rehabilitation interventions led me to a PhD investigating the impact of a targeted course of occupational therapy on people living in nursing homes after suffering from a stroke. For the past eight years my research has explored the impact that dementia and other neurological conditions can have not only on the lives of those affected by them but also on the family as a whole. In 2017 I completed a research project where colleagues and I designed and evaluated a lay peer support

intervention for stroke rehabilitation. Leading from that work my fellowship applied innovative co-design approaches to map the experiences and identify the sources of support of young adults living in families affected by dementia, stroke or multiple sclerosis. In 2020 I joined the <u>Centre for Ageing and Dementia Research (CADR)</u> where I continue to develop research focussed on designing and evaluating interventions tailored to support families, including young carers of people living with dementia. I am a Co-I on the <u>iSupport for Dementia Carers</u> NIHR funded project and leading the process evaluation. As part of this project, I have worked with the World Health Organization to adapt the original online tool for adult carers (*iSupport*) and we have recently developed *iSupport for Young People*. This is an online training programme that aims to support the mental health, knowledge, and skills of young dementia carers and help organisations, improve the support they offer. Leading from this work I am currently collaborating with dementia researchers and families in Spain (<u>Universidad de Sao Carlos</u>), and Italy (<u>University of Bologna</u>) to explore the adaption and implementation of this tool in those countries.

CURRENT RESEARCH INTERESTS/ONGOING PROJECT TITLE:

My current research is focussed on improving the lives and support available to young people living in families affected by dementia. The online training support package that we have developed (*iSupport for Young People*) is being rolled out in the UK and I am leading a PhD studentship focussed on the exploration of its implementation and impact. In line with this I am working with relevant UK, European and Internatinal collaborators in order to address the needs of this underserved group of carers who often live in families affected by Young Onset Dementia. I am also leading the process evaluation of the *iSupport for Dementia Carer RCT study* which will provide high quality evidence on how online e-health dementia support intervention are best designed, delivered and implemented.

HOW DO YOU INTEND TO CONTRIBUTE TO INTERDEM:

I have been lucky to attend and present my work with young dementia carers at a number of internatinal events such as the IPA (Lisbon, June 2023) and Alzheimer's Europe (Helsinki, October 2023). As a result of that I am currently in contact and collaborating with INTERDEM members all across Europe. The new task force on Young Onset Dementia that has recently been approved is great news. Being an INTERDEM member will be greatly benefitial to me in order to continue my work to support families, including their young members, affected by dementia.
