PROFILE OF MEMBER:

As a Senior Researcher at the Department of Medicine for Older People, Amsterdam UMC, I conduct research primarily within the University Network of Care for Older People (UNO) Amsterdam. UNO Amsterdam is a collaborative network that bridges science and practice by bringing together the department and 24 Dutch healthcare organizations providing home care and long-term care services.

My PhD research focused on advance directives in dementia care — an empirical-ethical study exploring how advance directives are managed in practice and how people with dementia, particularly those with Alzheimer's disease, value their situation.

I also contributed to and co-authored a white paper on palliative care in dementia, which presents the recommendations of the European Association for Palliative Care (EAPC). In addition, I am a member of the Network to Advance Research on End of Life with Dementia (NEAR-END).

Currently, my research is primarily embedded within the research line "Care for Frail Older People in Their Last Years of Life". I also supervise PhD candidates on the qualitative components of their studies addressing broader topics within elderly care.

CURRENT RESEARCH INTERESTS/ONGOING PROJECT TITLE:

My current research interests focus on complex decision-making processes involving people with decision-making disabilities, as well as on supporting physicians and other health-care professionals in optimizing care for older adults in the last years of life. To achieve these research objectives, I intend to include residents, patients, and people with conditions such as dementia, Korsakoff's syndrome, or Huntington's disease, alongside their family members and the health-care professionals involved.

HOW DO YOU INTEND TO CONTRIBUTE TO INTERDEM:

As a Senior Researcher at the Department of Medicine for Older People at Amsterdam UMC, I intend to contribute to INTERDEM by fostering collaboration between empirical, ethical, and practice-based research on decision-making and care for people with dementia and other brain disorders. My experience with collaborating networks at the national level — such as SANO (Collaborating Academic Networks on Elderly Care) and NEAR-END (Network to Advance Research on End of Life with Dementia) — has strengthened my belief in the value and impact of interdisciplinary collaboration. Within INTERDEM, I aim to contribute to crossnational research initiatives and to participate actively in relevant special interest groups.
