Niels heads the research cluster 'Caring and design research'. He also coordinates a LUCA-led platform for research and education on art and design in health, inclusion, and care in the Belgian Province of Limburg.

Additionally, Niels works as a design researcher and lecturer at LUCA School of Arts (KU Leuven, Belgium). His domains of interest are interaction and product design, participatory design and design for health. He worked on several projects on designing for and together with people (living) with dementia and other disenfranchised groups. He is also the co-founder of the Dementia Lab, which clusters research and educational activities and the name of a conference on dementia and design. Next, he is also the coordinator of a Marie Curie doctoral network (HOMEDEM) researching how design and care can join forces to ameliorate the lives of people with dementia and their informal caregivers. As the co-coordinator of the Erasmus Mundus Joint Masters Response-Able Futures he integrates strong participatory research methods in the curriculum of this international Masters in care and design. He has been active in Belgium, Hong Kong & Denmark both in education as well as in research.

HOW DO YOU INTEND TO CONTRIBUTE TO INTERDEM:

My primary ambition is to contribute actively to the methodology taskforce. I am convinced this would be a mutually enriching collaboration. While I am eager to learn from the psychosocial research approaches within INTERDEM, particularly concerning scientific rigor and validation, I can in turn contribute my expertise from design research.

Specifically, I can introduce:

- Innovative, non-verbal and participatory methods (such as co-design, prototyping experience centred design-ways of working) that empower people with dementia beyond the verbal
- A perspective on the role of the researcher not just as an observer, but as a facilitator and co-creator. This approach uses the researcher's subjectivity and reflexivity as an integral part of the research process, leading to deeper and situated insights.

I believe this cross-pollination of methodologies can strengthen the taskforce and lead to more inclusive and impactful research practices.
